Tax relief for schools in Britain in jeopardy

LONDON — British Catholies fear that a tax bill already accepted in principle by Parliament may place a heavy financial burden on Church schools despite government assurances to the contrary.

THE BILL has passed the second reading in the House of Commons, which means that it has received approval in principle. In lat January it goes to committee for detailed study, during which it can be amended. As it now stands the bill contains legal loopholes that may reduce somewhat its impact on a Catholic schools, it provides that arrived to include state-aided catholic schools—will pay only half the normal tax rate.

tion of local authorities and in most cases pay more than the 50 per cent rate provided for in the bill.

UNDER THE new bill, taxation of Catholic schools will also ne at the discretion of local authorities. Catholics fear that while in some cases the authorities may pay the school taxes, themselves, they may also demand particular to the bishops, who would then have to raise extra funds or face legal action.

WASHINGTON. D.C.—Clergy-men charged at the White House Conference on Aging that cleby persons who die in penniless cir-cumstances in many parts of the United States do not receive a decent Christian burial. Two Profestant ministers, in a panel discussion, cited a study by a Catholic priest in San Francisco of the findings they made in their own areas.

own areas.

A survey undertaken by Father Alfred Boedekker of St. Barnabas church, San Francisco, showed that many indigent persons were receiving "sack burials" and were somtimes interred in mass graves two and three at a time,

chaplain for the Episcopal Home for the Aged, Alhambra, Cal, said a study he made in the Los Angeles area disclosed conditions just as bad as Father Boedekker had found in northern California.

FATHER STELLAR said that

Father Donald Campion, S.J., an associate editor of America magazine in New York, said: "I hope the conference in general will stimulate action on the local level and smoke out backward areas to help the aging."

He said the prevailing feeling at the religious section of the conference was that religious groups need stimulation to show the many ways they can assist the aging.

WASHINGTON—At age 74, Elizabeth Lewis started dancing lessons. This was while she was enrolled as a first-time student at New York University.

M. Lewis is nearly 83 now and showed up at the White House Conference on Aging, a four-day study of old age statistics.

There are things more embarrassing to a university than having a football team with a 9-game losing streak or a hunger strike in the college cafeteria.

Faculty members of the University of Georgia must be among the world's most discouraged and embarrassed men since the shameful outbursts of racial hatred that have disgraced their campus in connection with the admission of two Negro students. Intelligent Southerners have always consoled themselves that the excesses of racial hatred in the South have been the manifestations of the woefully ignorant and uneducated sector of the population.

Probably many of that description participated in the Georgia University disturbances, but obviously some of the rioters were university students. These are the young men and women the faculty is called upon to educate—before they are fully civilized. Surely a discouraging task.

t has often been said that President Eisenhower was elected more as a "father image" than as an executive leader. Be that as it may, the image of a father was there primarily because of the evident human goodness of the man.

Whether the final judgment of history goes to those who see Ike as the Great Crusader who saved us temporarily from the wild-eyed radicals or to those who see him as a virtual nonentity, we know right now why he could not be attacked during the recent campaign.

Time for action

It was reported during December last that 200 persons a day were dying in the Congo; men, women, and children. They were — and are — dying of stervation because the harvesting, storage and distribution of food have been completely disrupted in some areas by the "troubles" there. The United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization, representing 24 nations, was not able after three emergency sessions in Rome to do more than examine an estimate of the cost of relieving the starvation. Agreement could not be found and human beings continued to starve.

There are about a million starving in China just now, we are told. Some say it is due to floods and other natural disasters, principally in the Yangtse Valley. Some say it is due to governmenta bungling and mismanagement. But at the control of the

One million, four hundred thousand refugees are trapped between the Jews and the Arabs in Palestine. There are as many trapped in Europe between the "East" and the "West." As many more are similarly trapped in South-east Asia. The groups are everywhere increasing and the people in these groups, when not actually starving to death, are rotting in their self-respect and in their usefulness to the world.

And did you know that last year was declared World Refugee Year? Some \$80 million was subscribed from various sources and is at the disposal of an International Committee. The recent report of the chairman, Dr. Elfan Rees, indicates no more than a hope that ways may be devised of 'keeping the world's conscience alive to refugee needs." In view of the general situation, this tempts us to an outburst of cynical hilarity and a suggestion that the International Committee for World Refugee Year, like the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization, represents more money than brains.

"Fools rush in where angels fear to tread." "Wisdom walks warily." There are no end to wise saws, and we could not agree with you more about them. We know all about the virtue of prudence, too: not to mention circumsection.

But human beings by the million are rotting in character. And human beings by the million are starving to death. And statesmen, politicians, experts, sit there and talk — "not wisely but too well."

• QUESTION BOX

Must a parish have lay trustee board?

By MSGR. J. D. CONWAY

Q. Is there anything in Canon Law to the effect that each parish must have an active Board of Trus-tees or Directors? If so what is the function of this board?



A. No, there is no mention in Canon Law of lay trustees or directors in a parish. The general law of the Church presumes that the administration of a parish is the responsibility of the pastor, under the authority of the bishop.

However, many dioceses have statutes which provide for lay trustees or directors to assist the pastor in temporal administration. Under the laws of some States these laymen may become members of the operation owns and operates the parish properties, Usually they are appointed by the bishop and the pastor, or are elected by the clerical members of the corporation. Their term of office is usually limited and it is understood that their functions are advisory or consultative.

In early days in this country the Church had some very sad experiences with lay trustees, who held title to Church property and often defied both bishop and pastor. Local schisms, suits at law, and spir-itual detriment were frequent results.

Medicine is a science and an art, resulting from the intense study, experiment, and experience of many thousands of men through many generations and centuries, all pooling their knowledge, passing it on in books, lectures and demonstrations, correct-ing, increasing, and perfecting it each succeeding

The average doctor has spent at least a third of his life acquiring the basic knowledge and skills of his profession, and will devote his remaining years reviewing, keeping up to date, and perfecting his abilities of diagnosis and treatment.

Where does the "healer" get his knowledge? Did God infuse it into him? Certainly he never acquired it the hard way—and the only sound way.

I doubt that the person who goes to a "healer" has enough sound moral judgment to be guilty of serious sin in the process. However there are two fertile sources of possible sin readily apparent:

(1) Against the First Commandment-by super-

stition.

(2) Against the Fifth Commandment—by endangering your health and your life.

A third sin might be committed by encouraging and co-operating in graft.

Certainly some of your friends have been helped.
People who go to "healers" are apt to be neurotic or have psychosomatic ailments—and these respond readily to the suggestion which the "healer" provides. Besides most common ailments are healed in due time by the inherent recuperative powers of the human body.

Q. Recently I heard a priest say at Mass that If parents did not send their children to catechism classes they would be refused Communion and also the last Sacraments when they are dying. A. One of the primary duties of parents is that of providing religious training for their children; and the average parents cannot fulfill this duty except by sending their children to Catholic schools or to catechism classes.

It should be evident that if you as a parent know It should be evident that if you as a parent know-ingly neglect one of your primary duties, you are guilty of serious sin—and unless you honestly repent of that sin you cannot receive the sacraments worth-ily. If you were to come to me in confession and toll me that you were refusing or neglecting to send your children to catechism—and that their religious education was suffering seriously in consequence, then you and I would have a little heart-to-heart talk right there. And unless you changed your mind and attitude I would have to refuse you absolution.

If that is what your priest meant then I would go along with him—after clarifying his meaning. But if he meant that these negligent parents would be publicly refused Communion at the altar rail, I would join you in being a bit shocked. And I am sure he must have been talking for effect if he stated without qualification that these parents would be refused the last sacraments.

Canon Law says that Holy Communion is to be Canon Law says that Holy Communion is to be denied to those who are publicly unworthy—and then it lists those who are publicly unworthy: the excommunicated, those under interdict, and those manifestly infamous. Negligent parents do not fit into any of these classifications unless there is a specific diecesan regulation or episcopal order imposing excommunication or similar ecclesiastical penalty on them.

As for the last sacraments they may be denied only when a stubborn sinner refuses to repent or when he is suddenly stricken unconscious without any ly when a stubborn sinner refuses to repent or then he is suddenly stricken unconscious without any glatest sign of reform. SEARCHING THE SCRIPTURES

Inspiration makes Bible different from all other books

By IGNATIUS HUNT, O.S.B.

The Bible is different from all other books. What makes it different is not its majestic style (though some of its books are exceptionally well written), nor its capacity to engage our interest (for while some books have this ability, others make admittedly dull reading), nor its overall elevation of thought (for some parts of the Bible enjoy this quality while others are doctrinally weak and may even at times shock unprepared readers).

The thing that makes the Bible unique is its inspired character. On this point the Catholic Church has never wavered. Biblical inspiration is a dogma of faith.

The term "inspiration" is itself biblical. St. Paul, writing to this beloved disciple Timothy-both of them converts from Judaism and acquainted with the Hebrew Scriptures from their childhood-states: all Scripture (Paul is referring to the Old Testament books, and perhaps to those of the New Testament that were by this time recognized as Scripture) is divinely-inspired , , ."

ONE GREEK word, theopneusies provides us with the trans-lation "divinely-inspired." This word means literally "breathed on by God," or "God-breathed." Paul's statement might be even better rendered: "All Scripture, divinely-inspired, is useful ..." In either case the meaning of the expression is the same.

A similar idea is found in 2 Peter, 1, 21, where the writer is dealing with biblical prophecy. He states that "prophecy never came about through the mere will of man, but rather, men of Gnd, carried along by the Holy Spirth, gave utterance." The Velgate translation of "carried along" is "inspired" (inspired). The idea of usen spokenia, or writing under driven timpuise is frequently found in the 6th Testament (cf. Jer. 2874). Exact 77, 14).

The thought of Peter and Paul is that Inspiration is an effect, produced by divine influence upon the writers of the Scriptures as they were writing.

The effect is ascribed to both principal and instrumental cause, for one is not effective without the other. The tools cannot produce a table without the carpenter any more than the carpenter can produce the table without the tools.

There is, of course, one big difference, as Pius XII indi-cates, in the case of the Bible. The instruments that God uses are living and reasonable spenis, each with his own character, abilities, formations, etc., so that the result will reveal, to no small degree, the instrument the has ampleyon.

Thus one biblical writer is a clever grammarian and stylist (Isaiab), while another may actually be guilty of solecisms and poor grammatical constructions (writer of the Apocalpyse). Obviously the biblical writers did not "pass out" under divine influence and write in a merely mechanical, trance-fashion.

HENCE, IF we use the term "dietainon" when speaking of God's authorship of the Bible, as did the Council of Trent ("Spirit Santoe dictante"), we must understand that this in no way deprived the writers of consciousness, of freedom, of their own peculiarities—for Scripture itself gives the lie to such a viewpoint.

It is precisely because God made us of human authors, who It is precisely because God made us of human authors, who received their thoughts and notions in many ways besides revelation, that we must study the entire background of oriental culture in order to evaluate correctly what the biblical writers want to tell us. The Church, as we have seen, has definitely taken a stand on this question.

Pope Leo XIII in his 1833 encyclical (The Most Provident God) gave a classic definition of biblical inspiration. "By supernatural power," he says, "God so moved and impelled the human authors to write, He so assisted them when writing, that the things which He ordered, and those only, they first rightly

Inspiration is then a process (as well as an effect) involving the human writer's intellect (speculative and practical judgment), will, and faculities—all of which fall under the divine influence in proportion to their function in a particular instance. The peak of this process, says St. Thomas, is the illumination of the speculative judgment, which deals with truth, with "right understanding."

The more lofty the matter at hand, the more potent must this illumination be. For a psalmist to express his personal grief does not require the illumination of mind that John needed in blinking out the elevated doctrine contained in the Prologue to his Gospel-account. In this sense, we may speak of degrees of inspiration, even though all Scripture is inspired.

THE PRACTICAL judgment is also vital in the process for it must decide how to express the truth at hand, Shall it be poetry, epic-narrative, the language of theology, or hyperbole? Are previously existing documents to be used, and if so, are they to be used as such or should they be recast?

In some instances the practical judgment needs more assist-tee than the speculative. In these intellectual steps, as well as the movement upon will and faculties. God's influence stork in the form of a special "charism", or grace granted to the

Did the sacred writers realize that they were writing under divine inspiration? In a few cases they may have been aware of this, but they need not have been, and it seems that in most cases they actually were not so aware. Thus the writer of 2 Maccabees complains (2, 27) of the immense labor his condensation of the five books of Jason has cost him; Cluke (1, 14) describes his research that led to the penning of the third Gospel; Paul wrote many of his letters to settle practical issues that arose in the churches he founded.

We may even say—in fact we must say—that every word of the Bible is inspired, for every word of the authentic Bible has come from the hand of an inspired writer. To assert that only those parts of Scripture that deal with "fatth and morals" are inspired is an error already condemned by Leo XIII. This must not be confused with revealant. BUT HOW do we know that the Bible is inspired? What is the criterion of inspiration? Since inspiration is something strictly supernatural, God alone can inform us on the fact.

The Church, then, is the only and ultimate criterion of bib-lical Inspiration, even though her decision is based to some extent upon such tests as orthodox doctrine, apostolic author-ship, etc. She volced her final decision on this matter through the Councils of Florence, Trent and the Valican.
